

WHAT MAKES YOU COME ALIVE? HOW DO YOU NURTURE YOUR SOUL?

Why church? What are we all about?

To me, it has to do with our souls and how we connect to the living God. The purpose of religion is to help us live more fully and in tune with God, with ourselves, and with one another. The church is a vessel for the Spirit of God to nurture, challenge, encourage, and lift our spirits.

Howard Thurman, the mentor of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., is quoted to have said, "Don't ask yourself what the world needs. Ask yourself what makes you come alive and do that, because the world needs people who are fully alive!"

What makes you come alive? What energizes you? What draws you in and inspires you? What is worthy of your time and energy to invest in? We are exploring just that in our "Drawn In: Living Creatively" worship series. We open up to the spark, the dream, and the energy that flows into us and makes us come alive. Think of it as God's seed that is planted in our hearts and takes root.

Faith is the attitude in which we explore our relationship with God, with ourselves, and with one another. Faith is the trust that there is more to explore

than just ourselves. There is a treasure to explore beyond the status quo. That's why one of our UCC mottos is, "God is still speaking," as the wisdom and insight, that we are never done. God is not yet done with us. One of my dear mentors, Sam Varner, used to say, "God loves us too much to leaves us as we are; we are always under construction."

The first tenet of our St. Paul's Mission Statement is, "Grow in faith." How do we grow in faith? By opening up to God. By paying attention to the Spirit's nudging. By nurturing our souls, the part in us that connects with the living God.

Just like our body and brain, our soul needs care, nurturing, attention, and love. To keep healthy, you eat well and move/exercise. To keep your mind fresh and alive, you exercise your brain. What do you do to keep your soul healthy, the part in you that connects with God?

This is where spiritual practices come in. They help us grow in faith, develop our spirit, and nurture our soul. Worshipping, taking time for devotion, meditation, prayer, taking a walk, serving handson, participating in a group study, writing a card, making a phone call, smiling, being kind, paying it forward, and the like. What makes you come alive? How do you nurture your soul?

"The glory of God is a human being fully alive," says the early church father, Irenaeus. I hope and pray that you pay attention to your soul, nurture your spirit, and invest in your relationship with God. It's the best thing you can do. I trust you make growing in faith a priority.



CHRISTIAN EDUCATION


One of the best ways to grow in faith is to participate in a study group.

ST. PAUL'S COUNCIL MEETING - JANUARY 11, 2022

Because of the timing of the newsletter publication, these newsletter minutes are not the official, approved minutes. After the minutes have been approved at the next meeting, the final minutes are available upon request.

In Attendance: Sara Adams, Susan Bolig, Kimmie Burkhart, Amy Caron, Bob Engel, Beverly Heinemann, Ivana Lluveras, Peggy Peeler, Pastor Dietmar Plajer, Sigrid Plajer, Shane Sanders, Craig Stark, Randy Tanner, Linda Turner, Josh Wenrich, Allen Wetzel, Michael Zettlemoyer. **Excused:** Kathy Ulrich.

2022 Council Elections: Nominations were taken. Linda Turner nominated Peggy Peeler for president, Beverley Heinemann seconded; Peggy Peeler nominated Linda Turner for vice-president, Randy Tanner seconded; Kimmie Burkhart nominated Randy Tanner for secretary, Linda Turner seconded. For each position, a vote was submitted through anonymous polling on Zoom. The following are the newly elected Executive Council: President Peggy Peeler, Vice-President Linda Turner, and Secretary Randy Tanner.

Minutes from December Council Meeting: A motion was made by Sara Adams and seconded by Bob Engel to approve the minutes from December. The motion was approved.

Financial Report: Linda Turner reported, presenting the financial reports from December, which were sent to the Council ahead of time. Randy Tanner made the motion to accept the financial report as read, Bob Engel seconded it, and the motion was passed.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Dietmar sent the report to the Council members ahead of time and reflected on the challenging 2 pandemic years that we've had. Finding the balance and being sensitive to volunteers, and staff, in the decision making can be challenging. Looking back on how far how we've come from last year, we have made a lot of strides over the year. His great concern remains with those home-bound members of the church. Without physically or electronically being able to connect with the church, it is a concern as they are isolated. We have been looking for a visitation ministry coordinator, but the COVID risk poses challenges. Much isn't able to get done, which weighs on him. Pastor Dietmar also elaborated on the Christmas Season – which is detailed later in these minutes.

Staying on: Archives (Bob Engel), Christian Education (Sara Adams), Ministry (Bev Heinemann), Music (Michael Zettlemoyer), Stewardship & Finance (Linda Turner), Worship (Bev Heinemann).

Pastor Parish Relations: Need one new person to join Lois Bruno and Raven Rudnitsky.

Leadership Zoom Orientation: Will be held on January 30th at 3:00pm via Zoom.

Christmas Services: Pastor Dietmar reported. We had 78 at the early service, and 72 at the 7pm service, which made it very manageable and relatively safe. Blue Christmas had no attendants, which is a mixed blessing – it meant that no one felt that they "needed" the Blue Christmas service. St. Paul's decided to use the Christmas Eve Offering as a donation to three non-profits: What a great gift to be able to give to others in need! We received almost \$5,000! The church also funded a Christmas Dinner at Sun Com, using monies from the Kitchen Cupboard funds.

Messy Church Update: Messy Church was postponed in January due to weather and COVID concerns. February's Messy Church was moved by one week because of the Super Bowl, so will be held on Feb. 6th.

Worship Service: We will continue to follow CDC guidelines. **Worship in Person, via Internet and by Phone - How Can we Improve? How is Tech Team with Volunteers Going?** Sigrid reported. Things are continuing as planned. We have some very dedicated volunteers, and that helps a lot. Things are going well. As a reminder, we are now streaming to YouTube as well, so people can subscribe to the YouTube page and receive an email when we go live. We had 9 people call in to a service in the last month using Phonelivestreaming.

What is St. Paul's Vision? How can we re-commit to our vision and purpose: to grow in faith, hope and love. Can we move forward out of our survival/Pandemic mode? How can we be bold and energized to join God's vision for us? We will talk more about this at the Leadership Orientation, and we will move forward slowly – it is difficult to hone in on this during the pandemic.

Creatively:" Carolyn Fairl is our "Artist in Residence" – what is the energy, what is the pull that draws us in? As we are growing personally, how does that creativity and tuning in to God's creative energy help move us forward? A communal art piece will grow week to week as we move through this series.

Adult Sunday School Classes: Sunday morning class: Marty and Lois were able to host it on Zoom this last Sunday because of the weather. Thursday evening: Raven's ability to facilitate the group is remarkable. Starting this new session is about fighting racism.

Kids Group & Children's Sunday School: Torri is a great blessing for this ministry and the children of St. Paul's.

Green Team/Living into Right Relationships Committee: The LRR committee is in the process of being created and launched. We are meeting on Jan. 13th as our first session. We will be talking about logistics and what we want things to look like moving forward.

Personnel Committee: Linda Turner shared.

Treasurer – we are currently updating the description, and it will be advertised in the Daily Item.

Nursery attendant – This position will also be advertised in the Daily Item.

PASTOR'S REPORT - DECEMBER 2021

Our St. Paul's Mission is to grow in faith, to worship God, to serve others, and to welcome all.

"Longing for Light, We Walk in Darkness..." This hymn expresses much of what we experience together these days, stretching and expecting the light of Christ to shine into our darkness. The prayer song continues with the refrain, "Christ, be our light, shine in our hearts..."

"The Inn: Housing the Holy" has been our worship theme during Advent and Christmas. Based on the main characters of the Christmas stories we explored how we can open our hearts to Jesus and how we can welcome and share him and his light with others. I am very grateful to all who made this season meaningful and moving. Our sanctuary was glorious with Christmas decorations. The musicians inspired, and the families who lit the candles on the Advent Wreath were wonderful.

We presented a Christmas Pageant in worship on December 19 and for Messy Church on December 12, thanks to Joanne Lauer and Youth Leader, Torri Stark. It was heartwarming. It's always inspiring to experience the message embodied in the participants!

At our Annual Meeting on December 12 we elected five new council members: Kim Burkhart, Craig Stark, Randy Tanner, Allen Wetzel, and Joshua Wenrich, and adopted the Mission Plan (Budget) for 2022. I am grateful for these new leaders!

Christmas was also the focus of the Messy Church program on December 12. It is inspiring to explore hands-on the Christmas Message through crafts, games, and activities. One highlight of the evening was the "Journey to Bethlehem" obstacle course. Every family received goodies to take home. Thanks to a great team led by Sigrid Plajer and the volunteers which make Messy Church possible!

Our food outreach ministries continue to be vital for our community. Loaves and Fishes served 74 families, which included 174 individual persons. Randy Tanner does a wonderful job in planning, coordinating, and guiding a team of great volunteers. This year, every family received a handcrafted Christmas tree ornament that the Messy Church participants decorated. The SACC (Selinsgrove Area Christian Council) provided this year 110+ food baskets to local families in need, loaded banana boxes with hams and all the trimmings for a wonderful Christmas Dinner. Rachael Rice through her connection with Toys for Tots provided gifts for all the children from the families we sponsor as a congregation. The families also received \$40 gift certificates for Boscov's to buy shoes or clothes as needed.

The Confirmation Class participants crafted and assembled lovely Christmas pyramids with tea lights, Christmas candy, and a message of faith, hope, and love for the season for our homebound members.

The Children's Ministry of our congregation is vital, instilling faith and Christian values in the lives of our youngest ones. Our Youth Leader, Torri Stark is wonderful in how she is teaching, leading, and coordinating a team of helpers. Volunteers for the Wednesday afternoon Kids Group and the Sunday morning Sunday School are always welcome.

As a congregation we sponsored an amazing Christmas Dinner for the clients and staff of SUNCOM in Northumberland on December 10. It was heartwarming to see all from SUNCOM celebrate and express their gratefulness to St. Paul's.

Our Candlelight Services on December 24 were the highlight of our Christmas season. We celebrated with two services, a family oriented service at 4 PM and a traditional service at 7 PM, both with wonderful music. Each of the services had some 70+ participants in person.

You, the members and friends of St. Paul's UCC, have been very generous! The entire Christmas Eve offering of almost \$5,000 will benefit three local organizations that do God's work in our community/area: Haven Ministries (the Sunbury homeless shelter), By Grace Transitional Housing (supporting women and children through housing, education and job search, in Middleburg) and Transitions (providing shelter, safety and support for persons in abusive relationships). I am deeply grateful for your generosity and kindness which make a huge difference in the lives of those who need it most in our community.

I am grateful to Rev. Darin Namminga for filling in for me in leading the worship service on December 26. Together with our amazing pianist Jaime Namminga (his wife) he inspired us to focus on the heart of Christmas.

Thank you for your prayers, your witness, your giving, your service, and your faithfulness to God and to God's work through St. Paul's. You are the hands and heart of Jesus in action!
