You can sign up in the foyer or through the church office for one of the study groups which

will be offered on Sundays and during the week and use it as an opportunity to connect, to learn and to grow in faith.

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# "Sustaining Creation - A Faith Journey for Small Groups"

I invite you personally, you, every member and friend of St. Paul's, to take this coming Lenten Season which begins with Ash Wednesday, Feb. 26, as an opportunity to explore from a faith perspective how God calls you and us as a congregation and community to grow, develop, and move forward in sustaining God's creation.

We will offer study groups on Sundays and during the week to give as many people as possible an opportunity to participate in person in our group conversation. If for whatever reason, you are not able to participate in person in a group, you can watch the video presentations online or from a DVD at home and participate in an online conversation.

Our Sunday Lenten Worship Series will pick up the "Sustaining Creation" theme. This is an additional opportunity for you to immerse yourself in discerning God's call for you. There is power in numbers. Together, we are more powerful and more effective.

This is how Rev. Dr. Terry Gallagher, the author of the series describes the Faith Journey: "As its name indicates, this series is all about journey. The Bible is filled with examples of journeys as the means necessary to transform people from unbelief to belief to action. Ranging from Jacob

to Moses to Jonah to Paul and even to Jesus, journey is the path they each took to wrestle with their doubts/demons/angels and ultimately to discern God's Call to action.



Right now, human civilization is on the brink of the greatest crisis that has ever been experienced. I'm talking about the destruction of the life systems of God's Good Creation and its cause is us, simply by the way our modern society has chosen to live. Here's the difficult truth: the next 10 years are a critical period in which we must change or the survival of billions of people and future generations to simply live is at risk. But this Creation Crisis is such a difficult truth to understand & accept that many of us have, like Jonah (and Paul), chosen to head in the opposite direction of what God is calling us to do. So, consider this an invitation for you to participate in a journey to discern how God would have us live.

Sustaining Creation: Planting Seeds of Climate Hope is a sixsession series intended to guide Christians on an extended journey to a new understanding of our Call to live sustainably with all of God's Good Creation. Richly grounded in scripture, this series includes reflections, interviews with Creation Justice faith leaders, taps into the wisdom of noted authors, takes the audience on location to ponder the Climate Crisis and includes discussion time so that together we can seek to discern how God is calling us to respond. Included in the series are participant discussion guides and action steps to living sustainably.

Here is an overview of the six sessions of "Sowing Seeds of Climate Hope:

- 1. Our Current Reality
- 2. New Energy
- 3. Sustainable Lifestyles
- 4. New Transportation Systems
- 5. Earth's Life System
- 6. Summary on Climate Hope

## **Messy Church - January 2020 Report**



We sent out invitations for Messy Church in December, and we had a few more children and parents attend that had either never been there or only once.

Messy Church is always good fun, but the Journey to Bethlehem Obstacle Course in December was probably the most loved activity. We try to have one physical activity that does not involve crafting, especially for those kids that want to move a little bit and don't appreciate sitting still all the time. We had far fewer crafts in December than usual because the ones we had were very time intensive. Making the Advent calendar took a good time, and so did making the edible nativity and the button Christmas tree ornament. The families had the

option to take home coloring sheets to make ornaments and a paper nativity and a Christmas wreath with candles.

Messy Church in January was about Jesus separating the people like a shepherd separates sheep and goats. The sheep in our story are the ones who have generous and compassionate hearts for others. Goats are independent and do as they please. Our crafts and activities focused on doing good for others (bird feeder, dog pull toy, donation jar), thinking about which of our actions would make us goats or sheep, making a fun sheep mask, having a blast at playing the sheep/goat separating game, making a delightful snowman LED tea light magnet to let our light shine even in January, making an edible sheep, and a coloring poster that everyone could contribute to by coloring a part of it.

Next month because of the Super Bowl, Messy Church will be on the second Sunday of the month, February 9 at 4:30. February's Messy Church is about how we can show love and service to others in a real and meaningful way. The Bible story is about the man who built his house on a rock and it could withstand rain and floods. The foolish man who built his house on sand saw his house collapse. The story reminds us that we have choices to make which influence the words we say, the things we do, how we respond to others and how they respond to us. In many ways, our choices form some of the foundations of who we are – like the foundations or lack thereof in the story.

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### **Green Team News**

### Did you know?:

Reducing consumption of meat can help contain production of greenhouse gases that impact climate change. It can also help lessen the demand for precious environmental resources such as land, water, and energy. Livestock production creates more greenhouse gases than the entire transportation sector - all the cars, trucks, planes, and trains in the world - and uses 75% of the earth's agricultural land. Producing ONE quarter-pound of beef uses 425 gallons of water enough water to fill 10 bathtubs and uses up enough energy to power an iPhone for 6 months. Skipping one serving of beef every week for a year saves the equivalent emissions to driving 348 miles in a car.

"Meatless Mondays" is an idea that was first introduced during World War I as a way to reduce consumption to help the war effort and was revived in 2003 as a non-profit public health initiative. Consuming less red and processed meat and more plant-based foods such as vegetables, beans, soy, and nuts can offer many potential health benefits include improving heart

health and reduce the risk of heart disease. It can also help decrease your risk of getting type 2 diabetes and help you maintain kidney health and a healthy weight.



#### Action

Consider participating in "Meatless Mondays" by making Mondays a meat-free day. Why Mondays? Research suggests that people are more open to trying healthy behaviors at the start of the week. Monday offers an opportunity to "reset" and get back on track after any lapses over the weekend and studies show people that get back on track at the beginning of the week are better able to maintain progress over time. Want more of a challenge? Maybe you can commit to a higher number of vegetarian meals or vegetarian days per week! Plan ahead while you're doing your weekend shopping so you can try

new vegetarian recipes. You could even meal prep some vegetarian options, such as vegetarian lasagna, or a nice pumpkin soup, that you have in your freezer ready for Monday lunches or dinners throughout a month. Think ahead of what you'll have for breakfast, lunch and dinner on Monday or your vegetarian day so when the time comes, you already know what you're going to have, and you don't fall back on your go-to meal that has meat in it

Worried about protein? You probably don't need to be - Research by the USDA shows that most Americans eat 1½ times more protein than their recommended dietary allowance (RDA) each day. If you're concerned about your health, you should always check with your doctor before making any drastic changes in your diet - although removing meat only one day a week wouldn't be considered a drastic change - better safe than sorry. 
