


OUR MISSION IS TO GROW IN FAITH, TO WORSHIP GOD, TO SERVE OTHERS, AND TO WELCOME ALL.

Many of these stories we have heard since we were young children, others may be strange or foreign to us, some of these stories we might think we may remember, but we may hear new details. Our goal is to listen to those stories anew; to learn the foundational realities about who God is and how God interacts with this world. My hope for all of us is to take comfort and be challenged by these stories.

In community, I hope to hear more of St. Paul's story through individuals. To discuss the heritage and the faithfulness that has led to where St. Paul's UCC is today. To listen to what values and what hopes St. Paul's has carried through the

years. To celebrate the highs and the lows, to talk about how the community rallied around one another in uncertain times and how they came together in the face of tragedy. I desire to hear how each member has become part of St. Paul's and entered into God's community more fully.



As Liam grows, he will have his own experiences and viewpoints on life, but by


raising him in faith we hope that he can establish this foundation as well. We are excited by the reality that we will continue to grow with our son and accept God's plan.

NEW WHEELCHAIR

If you are willing and able to help with one of the following items, or contribute toward one of them, please let the church office know. Two Laser Projectors for the Sanctuary: If you have been worshiping with us in person, you notice that the projected slides are slowly fading away. Even though we covered the windows by the screens to keep outside light from interfering, the quality is much waning. The current projectors were installed nine years ago, are aging and worn, and on their way out. They just can not do the job anymore. That is why we need two new projectors for the sanctuary, best before the old ones totally give out. We want crisp and clear images to match the quality of the services. Two new long-lasting laser projectors will accomplish that. Nine years ago, when the current projectors were installed, laser projectors were not available. Now they are and we as a worshiping community will greatly benefit from them. One high-quality laser projector to match the size or our sanctuary and screens will cost about \$5,000. We need two of them.

A Media Cart with Large LED TV: Our church meetings will continue in hybrid mode. This means, that Church Council and all other church committees will take place in person AND electronically, via Zoom. Some people who live in town, will participate in person. Others, who live away (like in Northumberland), or are traveling (like staying over the winter months in Florida) or for various other reasons can not join us in person (like people who do not drive at night any more), will join in via Zoom. We need a large flat screen TV, to make that possible. The current TV in the council room is too small to do a great job and to allow for good quality screen sharing. A media cart will help us move the TV on the lower level to where it is needed, to the Christian Education room for children to learn, the fellowship hall for "Hot Topic" presentations, etc. A good quality long-lasting media cart with large flat screen TV will cost about \$1,500.

A Light-Weight Wheelchair: Recently we have had a guest with a walking impairment twice visit St. Paul's for worship on Sunday morning. We want to be able to offer them a good quality, well functioning light-weight wheelchair. Currently, St. Paul's has two wheelchairs from the fifties or sixties, which are super heavy. They are located on the lower level by the Council Room. On Easter Sunday Pastor Dietmar carried one of them up the stairs to make it available to the guests. It was "back-breakingly" heavy even for Pastor Dietmar who considers himself to be strong. We really need to replace the two iron-heavy ones with a light-weight good quality wheelchair that any person can move and navigate inside and outside to the parking lot and back. It can also be a slightly used one. A new high quality light weight easy to operate wheel chair would cost about \$500.

A Garage Door Opener with Installation: The church's double door garage is unlocked at all times. We have lawn mowers, tools, EZ Up tents, tables, Loaves and Fishes huts, etc. stored there. We want to be able to keep everything safe, protect St. Paul's property from theft AND make the mowers, tools and equipment easily accessible for those who use them. An automated electric garage door opener will help us do that. It will lock the door and the garage to keep items safe, and will allow access through a remote and key pad to those who are authorized to use the garage. We estimate the cost for a good-quality automated garage door opener, including its professional installation, to be about \$750.

Minutes from March Council: Minutes were sent earlier via email by Randy Tanner; no changes were noted. A motion to approve the minutes was made by Al Wetzel, seconded by Bev Heinneman, and the motion was approved.

Financial Report: The report was sent earlier via email. Linda Turner answered the few questions posed and noted that the budget is on target for the year. A motion to approve the financial report was made by Randy Tanner and seconded by Shane Sanders. The motion was approved.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Dietmar sent out his report earlier via email. He mentioned that he has received many heartwarming comments on our entire Easter season: the joyous singing in church and all the special music and singing, Anna Ogunnaike being part of our Easter Service was a joy to her, Shane and all in attendance.

Unfinished Business & New Business

Worship Service: With the recent surges in new Covid cases, we will re-visit the suggestion of our former communion set-up again, hoping to implement this change this fall.

Worship in Person: Our congregation and others continue to use all our tech services weekly. Sigrid noted that our current projectors are 9 years old and suggested replacing them with new laser projectors that will have a much improved picture quality, will last much longer, and don't have bulbs that need to be replaced every few years. Council gave the go ahead to get quotes for new projectors in the near future.

Sabbatical Fill-In: We look forward to welcoming two local ministers to the pulpit on two occasions when Rev. Namminga is out of town. On June 26 Rev. Dr. Thomas Martin, and then on August 7 Rev. Mike Price will fill in.

St. Paul's Vision: Our Conference Minister Rev. Dr. Carrie Call has offered her assistance in providing clarity to discern our Post Covid forward visioning. We will revisit this in the Fall after Pastor Dietmar returns from sabbatical with a late Fall or early Spring roll-out.

Community Opportunities:

- Sigrid shared a photo of brightly painted chairs of all shapes & sizes with a sign reading "There is a seat at God's table for everyone". Much talk ensued with this sounding like a good idea to follow up on.
- SUN Area Work and Witness: Pastor Dietmar shared an upcoming local mission event at the Church of the Nazarene being sponsored by the SUN Area Work and Witness. From July 27-30 the event will provide help for local low-income families with projects. They are looking for volunteers and there is a \$15 sign-up fee.

Personnel Committee Report: We are still searching for someone for the Treasurer position. The committee met with two candidates for Church Secretary. Both are great candidates bringing much to discuss after Linda Turner, Sigrid Plajer, and Craig Stark were excused from the Council meeting. After considering the skills and compensation expectations of both, a motion to hire Linda Turner for the position was made by Randy Tanner and seconded by Shane Sanders. The motion was approved.

Messy Church:

Everyone attending the May 8 Messy Church enjoyed themselves, with many great volunteers helping. With summer, the team will take a break, returning in September.

Adult Sunday School:

Both Sunday morning hybrid and Thursday evening zoom meetings are taking a summer break and will return in the fall.

Kids Group, Children's Sunday School, and Teen Group:

The Kids Group and Children's Sunday School continue to be a positive experience for all those attending. The Teen Group enjoyed their first meeting, having some fun activities and getting to know one another. All these groups will not meet during the summer, but stay tuned for the Fall start-up of these groups.

PASTOR'S REPORT APRIL 2022

Our St. Paul's Mission is to grow in faith, to worship God, to serve others, and to welcome all.

Holy Week was deeply meaningful and moving especially this year as we are emerging from the pandemic. The Palm Sunday celebration with the children's processional "Hosannah, save us, Jesus" and the traditional "The Palms" recording from a couple of years ago warmed my heart. On Maundy Thursday we observed Jesus' last supper with his disciples, which became our Holy Communion with bread and grapes. We offered the traditional foot washing and walked with Jesus into the darkness of suffering and death through the Tenebrae part of the service. The Easter Sunrise service, with Easter Fire, and the Easter Celebration service, with Butterfly Dance, Senior Choir live presentation, and Easter Egg Hunt were the highlight of the season. I'm deeply grateful for all who made our services extra special, especially for the Worship Team who decorated the sanctuary to perfection with butterflies and flowers. The butterflies, as symbols of resurrection, reflect our Easter Season "Emerge" theme. Together with Jesus, we hatch from cocoons and tombs, spread our wings, take flight, and rise with Jesus to a new life in Christ.

Messy Church on Palm Sunday was the

best so far with 60 persons participating. With crafts, art, activities, Bible story, and a meal, young families and adults explored the message and meaning of Easter. Thanks to a great Messy Church team and to the many helpers who make it a wonderful experience. Messy Church is a key ministry of St. Paul's that also reaches families from the community who do not otherwise connect with St. Paul's.

We visited the Sunbury Synagogue with 13 participants from the Confirmation Class and the congregation at large on April 3. Rabbi Nina Mandel introduced us to the life and services of Congregation Beth-El. It was wonderful to explore how our Jewish sisters and brothers practice their faith and serve the community.

The Card and Care Ministry Team, a group of faithful and caring persons sends weekly cards to members and friends of St. Paul's who are facing challenging situations. I am grateful for all of the team who pray and share God's love and care in tangible ways. It is wonderful to know that one is lifted up in prayer and assured of God's presence through life altering challenges.

Youth Leader, Torri Stark and Jevan Beaver planned for and facilitated a wonderful Youth Group event with nine teens participating on Sunday, April 24. It is great to create new opportunities for St. Paul's and area teens to engage for meaningful activities. Thank you to Torri and Jevan for making this happen and for planning for a summer event and regular fall youth activities.
