"Sustaining Creation: Planting Seeds of Climate Hope"

There are TWO books of God, said St. Francis, the Bible and God's Creation and both are holy. Our Holy Scriptures of the Hebrew ("Old") Testament and of the New Testament are sacred witnessed of people who experienced the living God as creator of the universe, as liberator from slavery, as sustainer through challenges, as savior, healer, and prophet in Jesus, and as giver of hope and new life beyond death.

Jesus points us to pay attention to God's Creation and to its message and wisdom. In the parable of the sower, the seeds and the soils, Jesus challenges those who have ears to listen, whether they are receptive for God's message, or whether worries choke and smother their faith. Jesus tells us, look at the birds; look at the lilies. They don't worry. God cares for them. God cares for you. Why do you worry? Jesus compares our faith to a mustard seed that grows beyond our wildest imagination. God's creation is holy and precious, a sacred gift of God. What would we be without God's

good creation? What would we do without "Mother Earth" who nourishes and sustains us? Our Jewish sisters and brothers in faith regard ALL creation as infused by God's Spirit and by God's holiness. ALL is God's. It's all GOD's. When our Jewish sisters and brothers pray over a meal, they do so knowing that they take and receive from God's bounty. And so do we. It's all God's sacred body, sacred gift to behold, to treasure and to delight in.

Albert Schweitzer reminds us to practice deep reverence for ALL life. God's holy creation is sacred, alive, infused with God. The way we treasure, treat or abuse God's creation we treasure, treat or abuse God.

During this Lenten Season we will focus in worship and in our small group studies on God's sacred and holy creation and how we can sustain it. We open our hearts and minds to become more aware of the climate crisis and how we can plant seeds of hope. The climate crisis is real. Ninety-seven out of 100 scientists agree on this. Our global house is on fire. What are we going to do about it?

I ask you to make it a priority to join us in worship for the "Sustaining Creation" series beginning with March 1st. Also, please join one of our small study groups listed on page 1 to explore in the comfortable setting with fellows and friends what we as individuals and what we as a faith community can do to avert the worst, to plant seeds of hope, and to return to treasure and treat Creation as God's sacred gift. I'm counting on you!

Update From the Tech Team

Church Council has approved the switch to Breeze, a church management software program. The first obvious change already implemented is that our online giving will now go through Breeze. If you use eGive, please go to our new website as soon as possible and make the switch. Breeze Online Giving is a much easier and more pleasant experience and is safe. No credit card or direct debit info is stored on Breeze or our website; it is all processed very safely and securely through Stripe (but through the Breeze "portal." On our website, you will find links for both setting up the new Breeze Online Giving and for canceling eGive under the menu Give. Giving electronically can really help St. Paul's and make the money counters' life easier by giving electronically. Try it! Jevan Beaver is our online giving "ambassador." He will sit down with you and help you set things up, if you'd like his help.

Breeze will do much, much more for St. Paul's. Kids can be checked in electronically and receive a printed name tag. Attendance at various events is much easier to track through Breeze. Volunteers can receive timely reminders. Best of all, this program can be used by many people in our church to communicate, organize, keep track, follow up, etc. We will finally be able to use our data effectively.

Anyone who wants a Breeze account can email Sue for an invitation to set it up. At this time, you can manage your recurrent Breeze Online Giving through your Breeze account and look at the info that we have stored about you and check it for correctness. Once we have completed the huge task of cleaning up the membership list, we will use Breeze as an online directory just like we use our printed directories. We will also be able to print out directories through Breeze. YOU will always be able to see a whole lot of YOUR own info and only YOUR OWN giving information. With the online directory in Breeze, you would be able to look up another members contact info in the future.

Breezy times ahead! We are excited to embark on this new future.

One Great Hour of Sharing - Please Give Generously - March 22



Our beloved United Church of Christ, together with partners in ministry, helps those who face hardships, disasters, and tragedies. We ask you to join together with our sisters and brothers in faith to help those who need it most.

Recovery is challenging enough for people with means, but hundreds—including people with fixed incomes, the ill, elderly, and disabled—simply lack the resources to rebuild on their own. With generous contributions to One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS), the United Church of Christ, with the help of volunteer work teams from around the country, who have given thousands of hours, have restored close to 200 homes in Florida. A 70-year-old disabled Navy veteran said, "Having a roof that was leaky and falling in was very difficult for me. I did not know what I would do." His Volusia County, Florida home lost most of the roof's shingles to Hurricane Irma's winds (2017). The storm opened the way to major leaks, which destroyed much of the ceiling in the main living area and bedroom.

UCC Disaster Ministries partnered with Volusia Interfaiths/ Agencies Networking in Disaster (VIND) to help the most vulnerable disaster survivors. VIND helped the veteran obtain a loan to pay for a new roof, and deployed a volunteer work team from Altoona (Pennsylvania) United Church of Christ to complete the interior repairs in his home. "The volunteers...did it with such love and compassion, taking the job under their wings and making it perfect," the veteran said. "My health was deteriorating due to breathing in particles and debris from the water damage in my home, but it is improving now. I have a new outlook and I am no longer depressed." Thanking

VIND and the volunteers, he said, "You have changed my life."

Needs are being met in Florida with support from OGHS. Volunteer work teams, a construction supervisor, and over two dozen UCC congregations have volunteered to help repair homes.

"While progress has been made in Florida over the last year in recovery, there are still significant unmet needs," said Ken Skalitzky, UCC Disaster Recovery Specialist for the Eastern Region. "Please support disaster recovery with your work teams, donations and prayers," Skalitzky said. "Our ability to support long-term recovery in Florida is but one example of our living the gospel of Christ."

Minutes of Previous Meeting: The minutes from January 13th and the treasurer's report were approved.

Pastor's Report- Pastor Dietmar mentioned how well Messy Church, Youth Groups and Sunday School are being received.

Long Range Planning – This topic will be discussed in a smaller group and then brought to the congregation.

Group Study - Starting February 26, there will be a church wide group study "Sustaining Creation". We have several facilitators and group meeting times.

Green Team - There will be a "Greening for St. Paul's Team Workshop" on March 29th after church. Lunch will be provided. A student from SU will be working with the team for his capstone project and will do an energy audit for us. There will be several presentations and activity tables.

Technology Upgrade - The new internet contract was approved and signed, and the new modem should arrive soon. Dan Renkel and Mike Proger have done the work to allow internet coverage in the downstairs areas. Two new computers will be purchased for the office secretary and for the financial personnel. A new software program "Breeze" has been assessed to replace "Church Windows". It has many features we did not previously have and is very user friendly. Each church member can have an account, and electronic giving will be available. Jevan Beaver will help people with accounts. This software will be \$50.00 a month as was approved by both Council and the Stewardship and Finance Committee.

Visitation Minister - We will need a visitation minister to replace Pastor Penny, who is moving to Virginia.

PFLAG - Jack Lewis reported that establishing a PFLAG support group is in progress.

Funeral Coordinator – Mary Ann Weader will be the coordinator for funeral meals held at St. Paul's. Kay Moffatt and Bill and Linda Bowers will help with these meals. We can also accommodate caterers.

Table Replacement - We will be replacing the old, heavy and worn wooden tables in Fellowship Hall with lighter weight ones. We will need 14 tables at a cost of \$80 a table. We are looking for people who might like to sponsor a table.

Additional Items - Council members discussed their priorities for St. Paul's.

Church members should make sure that Pastor Dietmar is aware of people in the hospital, so that visitations can be made.

New Business:

Nursery Attendant - A motion was approved to hire a nursery attendant due to the resignation of Ivana Lluveras.

Membership List - Growth and Membership will be updating the membership list by looking at those who have moved or not attended in some time. We will send them a letter encouraging them to come again if able.

Easter Breakfast - Easter breakfast will not be provided this year. In lieu of this, there will be an opportunity to meet at a local restaurant after the Easter dawn service.

Summer Worship - Summer worship time beginning with Memorial Day Weekend, May 24th, will begin at 10:00 AM again.

Pastor's Vacation – March 7th and 8th were approved as vacation days for Pastor Dietmar.

Senior Choir Accompanist - A motion was approved to seek an accompanist for the Senior Choir. A motion was approved to hire the Youth Choir accompanist, Olivia Bodner as the Senior Choir accompanist. She will still serve the Youth Choir.

Church Envelopes – A motion was approved to buy church envelopes early to save money.

Summary of Minutes – A motion was approved to simplify the newsletter minutes to save paper. If desired, a copy of the full minutes may be obtained in the church office.

Committee Reports:

The Christian Ed. committee reported that things are going well with the Kids Groups and with Sunday School. A Nightwatch Service trip to New York is planned, as well as other activities. Messy Church has had 160 different people in attendance since its inception.

Pastor's Report - January 2020



Our St. Paul's Mission is to grow spiritually, to worship God, to serve others, and to welcome all.

Messy Church continues to be a great success with 67 people participating on January 5. The theme was on sheep and goats. Either we trust Jesus and follow him like good sheep or we disregard Jesus' call to care and to be compassionate and do our own thing (goats). The evening included lots of fun crafts, activities, games, music, Bible story, and a free meal. I'm deeply grateful to all who make Messy Church happen. It is a delight to see people of all ages enjoy church.

Together with Jack Lewis and Randy Tanner, I participated in a Teen Suicide Prevention workshop at the American Legion in Sunbury on January 6. Most importantly, every child and teen needs a stable relationship with at least one caring adult to make it through challenging situations. A panel of counselors, law enforcement officers, EMTs, and leaders of community organizations, like the United Way, presented information and facilitated the conversation.

Several of our new members joined us for the beautifully planned Birthday Celebration in the fellowship hall on Sunday, January 19. Rachael and Bob Rice did wonderful in preparing for the event and in making all feel comfortable and enjoy the event.

We gathered for our annual Leadership Orientation with the

newest members of St. Paul's joining the event following the birthday celebration. We explored mission, ministries, how we function as an organization and what makes things run smoothly at St. Paul's. Thanks to all who share their time and talent in furthering God's work and ministries.
