



OUR MISSION IS TO GROW IN FAITH, TO WORSHIP GOD, TO SERVE OTHERS, AND TO WELCOME ALL.











I love our Gospels in how realistically they depict Jesus in his passion and victory. Jesus becomes tangible and real. I hear the excited crowd celebrating Jesus' triumphant entrance into Jerusalem. I can feel the anger of lesus as he turns over the tables of the money changers. I am awed by the wisdom of Jesus as he teaches in the temple and responds to those who try to trap him with, "Should we pay taxes?" I am inspired by how Jesus, like a servant, washes his followers' dirty feet. He shares himself at the Passover Meal and reinterprets it, drawing all of us into the feast of God. Jesus is wrestling in the Garden of Gethsemane. He is betrayed. He is in agony as he is nailed to the cross. It cannot get more real than that.

I'm grateful for how real Jesus is, flesh and blood, and how he meets us in our

suffering. We continue to explore the sacred stories of Jesus' Passion during Lent. Where do we find ourselves in Jesus' stories? How do they speak to us as we enter them?

The prophet Isaiah describes the suffering servant, who is willing to carry our burdens. Jesus does that for us by being close to us in our own suffering and pain. I often wish life would be easier. But it is not. It is comforting to me that Jesus is real, flesh and blood, close by us when we experience tragedy. When we lose sight. When we feel lost, abandoned, or overwhelmed. Jesus has been there. He knows what it feels like. And he promised to be with us in the mud and muck of our lives. I tend to forget that. I need our worship services to remind me of that. To draw me in and make sense of the suffering. To grow closer to God.

This Lent we are walking into the deepest darkness and suffering with Jesus. On Maundy Thursday at 7 p.m. we witness Jesus' self-giving love. We experience the darkness and silence of death itself with our Tenebrae service. On Good Friday from 12-3 p.m. we gather for a Community Service at Sharon Lutheran Church to walk with Jesus through his final hours. Without walking with Jesus into the darkness of death, I cannot grasp the significance of Easter.

Holy Week becomes holy for us when we grow closer to Jesus in his suffering and victory. Jesus is raised, and we are rising with him to a resurrection life. He lives and raises us to new life. I'm really excited about our Easter Services and Easter Season. We will explore together how Jesus sets us free and how he transforms us. Easter helps us unfold and unlock our potential. We grow wings and soar with Jesus.

Invite a friend and join us for a meaningful and moving Lent and Easter celebration in the footsteps of Jesus. I love our Gospels as they invite us to immerse ourselves in Jesus' passion and victory.





ST. PAUL'S COUNCIL MEETING FEBRUARY 13, 2024

Because of the timing of the newsletter publication, these newsletter minutes are not the official, approved minutes. After the minutes have been approved at the next meeting, the final minutes are available upon request.

In Attendance: Pastor Dietmar Plajer, Sigrid Plajer as guest, Lisa Krex, Jacob Koch, Carol Miller, Joanne Lauer, John Fischer, Allen Wetzel, Randy Tanner, Kimmie Burkhart, Malcolm Derk, Torri Stark, John Stante.

Minutes of January Meeting: The January meeting minutes were approved as submitted.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Dietmar sent his report out in advance of the meeting. The new worship series for Lent, Ash Wednesday, & Easter: "Entering the Passion of Jesus". It will focus on where and how we find ourselves in the stories of Holy Week.

Financial Report: The January Financial Reports were sent out in advance of the meeting and were approved as presented.

New Council Members: We need a replacement for Mary Dahlmann (2025 class). Torri, as secretary, will coordinate the recruiting efforts.

Strategic Planning: Hospitality - Pastor Dietmar stressed the importance of all members welcoming new people in the pews both before and after the service by church members. It was suggested that we move visitor name tags to the front table closer to the doors. Pastor Dietmar will talk to the Church Growth & Membership committee about post-service greeters.

Associate Pastor: The church profile is finished and will be submitted for signatures and posted on the UCC website.

Renovation Project: Jacob Koch reported that the contractor will start the renovation project the week after Easter. The construction is broken down in three areas: Area A will be on the Mill Street side - sidewalk & additional concrete by the lobby doors to accommodate funeral needs. Area B will be the alley the two stairwells, sidewalk, and elevator. Area C will be on the north side of the building - sidewalk and stairs. Target completion is the third week in June.

Safety Plan: Property and Grounds will discuss remaining 'To Do' items on the safety plan: inside door numbers, exit signs, push bar front doors, evacuation maps, water/sewer shut off, knox box with key for Emergency Personnel, additional AED for Fellowship Hall, and lock bar instructions.

Youth Leader Search: There is no update - Christian Ed and Personnel committees will continue to work on it.

Nursery Coverage: There is no update - Christian Ed and Personnel committees will continue to work on it.

Capital Campaign Committee: John Fischer reported that the campaign team is working on a brochure and a plan to talk to people. The official name for the project is Renewing St. Paul's. \$140,000 is still needed to reach the \$300,000 budget goal, and any extra money raised will go to other renovations as needed.

Committee Reports

Property & Grounds: Spring Clean Out and Clean Up - Saturday, April 6, 9-12. Jacob reported that people are needed to help both before and on April 6. Musicians and the Worship Team will help before the event, and volunteers from the congregation will help during the event. Volunteers are needed to help clear out the music storage room for the Associate Pastor's office and a few other cluttered areas. Coffee & donuts with Pastor Dietmar will be at 8:45, and a pizza lunch will follow the clean up at noon. Jacob also reported a need for more committee members. He would like to delegate different areas of the church to different people to oversee so the responsibilities are better distributed.

Personnel Committee: Joanne Lauer volunteered to serve with Malcolm Derk and Allen Wetzel, but the scheduling, supervision, and finding of substitutes for nursery personnel is not covered. Pastor Dietmar is looking for someone who is willing to help. Malcolm Derk reported that Buddy's Cleaning Service will continue to help John with custodial needs until his surgery and throughout his recovery.

Holy Week: Palm Sunday is March 24 with Meet and Eat in the Fellowship Hall following the service. Maundy Thursday service is March 28 at 7 pm. The Good Friday Community Service is at Sharon Lutheran Church on March 29 from noon - 3:00 pm. Easter Sunday is March 31 and there will be a sunrise service at 6:30 am with the classic service at 10:30 am. Groundbreaking for the renovation project, Renewing St. Paul's, will follow the 10:30 service.

Communion March 3: Class of '26 - Jacob Koch, Carol Miller (captain), Jon Stante & Torri Stark. More communion elements need to be prepared as attendance numbers are higher.

PASTOR'S REPORT - JANUARY 2024

Our St. Paul's Mission is to grow in faith, to worship God, to serve others, and to welcome all.

"God is Holding Your Life" is our worship series for the New Year. We are invited to trust God and share with one another how we have been held and how we can hold each other. Our choirs, musicians, accompanists, and pianists contribute immensely to our services. I am grateful for them and for all who provide Children's Messages and function as lectors and as greeters. Our Worship Team helped decorate.

We installed our new Council Members in worship on January 21: Jacob Koch, Joanne Lauer, Lisa Krex, Carol Miller, Jon Stante, and Torri Stark. I'm grateful for all who serve on Council and for those in their new leadership positions: Randy Tanner as President, Malcolm Derk as VP and Torri Stark as Secretary. My heartfelt gratitude goes to those who went off Council: Sara Adams, Amy Caron, Shane Sanders, Linda Turner, and Michael Zettlemoyer. Thank you for your faithful service!

We gathered for the Leadership Orientation after the service on January 21 to focus on our vision, mission, and ministries and ensure that St. Paul's operations run smoothly. Good communication is key for that.

I've been cooperating closely with the Property and Grounds team on the planning for the big renovation scheduled for this spring/summer and with the Capital Campaign team who is helping us raise funds for this much-needed renovation. We have \$300,000 budgeted for the work, which includes funding for contingencies. The great news is that we already have \$160,000 available due to the generosity of Dianne Sheaffer and those who contributed to the Major Repair Fund through the years. We still need \$140,000. I'm excited that the project includes installing an elevator to the fellowship hall which makes it ADA accessible and so much easier for the Loaves and Fishes food deliveries.

Much of my times and energy goes into coordinating ministries with our committees and ministry teams, including Messy Church. I continue to visit with people in the hospital, partner in ministry with colleagues and churches in our Central Association, Penn Central Conference, and our Selinsgrove Area Ministerium. I contribute to the weekly eNews emails and monthly newsletters.

Thank you for your prayers, your witness, your giving, your service, and your faithfulness to God and to God's work through St. Paul's. I see God at work in and through you!




Our Special Offering in March goes to One Great Hour of Sharing. Please support this worthwhile mission. You can give online here.

DISCONTINUING USED BATTERY COLLECTION




