ON WHERE AND HOW TO EXPERIENCE GOD'S SPIRIT

Can anything top the Easter resurrection experience of Jesus rising from the grave and Jesus raising us to a new life? He defeated the doom and gloom of the tomb raising us into the light, infusing us with hope eternal.

Yes, there is! The next step of our faith journey leads us into experiencing the fire and flame of God's Spirit. While the risen Christ has been seen and experienced in person by the women and his disciple friends back in Jerusalem and its surroundings 2,000 years ago, God's Spirit is universal, transcending space and time.

We can feel the creative power of the Spirit in our lives here and now, in our congregation and in our community as breath of life, in love relationships, as bridging divides toward understanding, as passion for justice and peace.

The Bible talks of various expressions of the Spirit. The breath of life is one of them. As God breathed life into Adam and Eve, as God's Spirit hovered over the waters of creation, God's Spirit is alive in us. When you relax and pay attention to your breath you realize that it's not you making yourself breathe. Your body breathes without you willing it, whether you are awake or asleep. The Bible calls it breath of life, God's Spirit breathing in us, making us come alive. Where and how do you take time to pay attention to your breathing, to God's Spirit breathing in and through you?

The Pentecost story describes God's Spirit as flames and fiery tongues infusing the community of Jesus' disciple friends with new life, energy, and passion. They are fire and flame, so radically infused with Spirit, that they share the great works and wonders of God with their whole beings. They come fully alive, praising God and carrying the message of God's Spirit Power through the ages. The Spirit's movements reverberate through the ages into our own lives and reality.

The Letters of the Early Church describe our gifts and talents as fruits of the Spirit. Singing, drawing, caring, writing, giving, understanding, you name it, they are gifts. We do not make them happen. They are deeply seated in us. We can embrace and further our given gifts and talents and become better and excel at them or not. In what way are you gifted and how do your gifts and talents find expression in your life? That is how the Spirit is alive and moving in and through you.

When you see someone being used or abused, taken advantage of or treated unfairly, you may notice anger rising in you. The heat and anger over injustice and inflicted pain and suffering are expressions of the Spirit of God, the Spirit of Life. From the prophets of the Hebrew Scriptures to today, people moved by the Spirit expose injustice and unfairness. "No justice, no peace," you heard it expressed. In the United Church of Christ we have a vision towards just peace, meaning, if you want peace, work toward justice, fairness, equality, and inclusion. Justice extends beyond our human relationships to all creation. Working toward Creation Justice, means we care for God's creation as we do for one another. God's

justice extended beyond you and me to all human beings, no matter who they are, and to all creation. In the power of the Spirit we become advocates for justice, compassion, and peace.

You may experience that time flies when you immerse yourself in a craft, hobby, or activity. You can get so wrapped up and excited that you forget yourself in the process. Artists and athletes call it being in the flow, in sync. You may get so excited and come so fully alive in an activity that you forget yourself, your ego. That can be an expression of Spirit. Children are in touch with this more than grownups. They can dance in the rain, forget everything around them as they play, just be without keeping track of time.

Is there something greater to experience than Easter? Yes! God's Spirit powerfully at work in our lives and community right here and now. God's Spirit inspires, moves, imbues us with gifts and talents, comes alive in us when we stand up for things that matter, when we care and lose ourselves in an activity or in service to others.

I invite you during this May to take time to tune into the Spirit's movements that you may come fully alive, fire and flame for God's creation, justice, and

Minutes – A motion was made by Kathy Ulrich and seconded by Linda Turner to approve the minutes from March 9th. The motion was approved.

Financial Report – Bill Hockenbrock reported. Bob Engel made the motion to accept the financial report, Rick Campbell seconded. The motion was approved.

Pastor's Report – Included in newsletter.

Unfinished Business & New Business:

- Worship in person, via internet and by phone How do you feel it is going? Any suggestions or concerns? Sigrid reported: In-person and live-streaming is going well. Phone calls are consistent as well 5-7 people join by phone every Sunday.
- *Messy Church* April 18. Sigrid Plajer reported: 33 people are signed up for this coming Sunday. Generally it's 40-45 people attending. The theme is Caring for Creation this week.
- Children's Sunday School/Youth Ministry, Easter Pageant Stacy Heinemann reported: Everyone seemed to enjoy the pageant it got rave reviews. Sunday School is back to the Illustrated Earth program.
- Leadership Orientation Zoom Meeting -March 21 went well, nice attendance.
- Easter Gift Bags -178 gift bags delivered. Pamphlet for Holy Week devotions plus a short video on Facebook it was

very well received and went well.

- Palm Sunday: 32 attended. Maundy Thursday: 13 attended. Easter Service: 46 attended.
- More greeters now that people are getting vaccinated? The Council discussed the possibility that some more people will be returning to in-person worship now that vaccines are more widely available. Since we will be continuing social distancing protocols, we discussed having one person at the entrance to the sanctuary to help the newly returned with seating. - UCC Central Association Annual Meeting Sunday April 25 at 3:00pm via zoom.

 Need 2 representatives from St Paul's Bob Engle volunteered. Who else would be available? Marty Blessing volunteered to attend. Sue will email the link out to them.
- Wireless microphones update. Sigrid reported: They have not been ordered yet as we did not want any issues during Holy Week and Easter it is on the agenda for the coming week.
- Creation Care When and how will we continue to learn, explore, act and advocate for Creation Care and become a more sustainable congregation? Green Team leader Shane Sanders reported: Hoping to have the Green Team meet this summer so we can plan for the fall maybe planning something for Earth Overshoot Day in late summer. If there

- **Property and Grounds** Rick Campbell reported:


The Youth Leader position will be discussed at the next Christian Ed meeting.

Pastor's Report - March 2021

Our St. Paul's Mission is to grow in faith, to worship God, to serve others, and to welcome all.

Creating and distributing the Easter Gift Bags for local church members and friends has been a wonderful project. We received much positive feedback. Thank you to Susan Bolig for initiating this project and to all who contributed to bring it to fruition. I created the Holy Week Devotional and our Media, Technology, and Communications Coordinator (MTCC), Sigrid Plajer, transformed it into an appealing format that we used via all platforms of communication, website, social media, email, and print copies.

"Walking with Jesus through Holy Week" from Palm Sunday to Easter, March 28 to April 4, was our focus in worship and meditation. I created a brief video for every day of Holy Week as an introduction to the focus and meaning of each day of Holy Week. It was an invitation to follow Jesus step by step and explore the message and meaning for each day. Again, our MTCC, Sigrid Plajer became the key figure in filming, editing, and adapting each video for use.

We concluded our "Holy Vessels: A Season of Recovery" worship season during Holy Week. We were invited to go into the grieving, pain, and brokenness of our communal and personal experiences during this Covid-19 pandemic. Like shattered glass we experienced the sharp edges of loss and grief, inviting God's grace and healing to wash over us, to sand off sharp edges and create pieces of beautiful beach glass. I'm

grateful to all who provided Children's Messages during March: Jane Taylor, Peggy Peeler, and Wendy Mull, and to those who functioned as lectors: Linda Turner, Missy McCabe, Daria Kaminskyj, and Shane Sanders.

Our Music Ministry continues under the challenging conditions of the pandemic. I am deeply grateful to Maya Caron for directing a Bell Ensemble during this Lenten Season and to all ringers who participated to make our season special and meaningful. Our Senior Choir members continue to offer virtual anthems for special occasions under the leadership of Amy Caron. Soloists contributed their special gifts through recordings and Carolyn Patton and Jaime Namminga inspire and move us on the piano. I'm very grateful to Joanne Lauer for functioning as Hymn Leader on so many occasions.

Messy Church on March 14 focused on planting seeds of faith and on decorating a cross in the context of our Lenten and upcoming Easter season. I am grateful to all on the great planning team who help children, families, and adults experience faith hands-on through arts, crafts, story, and games.

Thanks to Lisa Krex for inviting us to the "Faith in Action" event on gun violence prevention. One of the four panelists was our UCC Penn Central Conference Minister, Rev. Dr. Carrie Call. Initiated after the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting tragedy, "Moms Demand Action: For Gun Sense in America" has become a great organization that works toward preventing gun violence within

the parameters of the Second Amendment. To be SMART about guns (Secure all guns, Model responsible behavior around guns, Ask about unsecured arms, Recognize suicide risks, and Tell peers to be "SMART").

I'm grateful to all who participated in our Leadership Orientation on Sunday, March 21 at 2 PM as we explored matters of faith from personal experience and reviewed resources about how we function effectively as an organization.

Our Loaves and Fishes food outreach ministry continues to be a key support to local families in need. I'm grateful to our coordinator, Randy Tanner, and all volunteers who support this vital ministry!

Thank you for your prayers, your witness, your giving, your service, and your faithfulness to God and to God's work through St. Paul's. You are the hands and heart of Jesus in action.
