What are you grateful for? When we share around the Thanksgiving table, family and friends always come first. When we keep sharing, we continue with visible and tangible things: home, food (especially mashed potatoes and apple pie), clothes, heat, games, etc. In a third round, we share on what you cannot see: love, joy, hope, faith, God, and life itself. Life in its various dimensions, the ability to count blessings and express gratitude. Life itself is a gift. It's precious. It's wow!

Messy Church, always on the second Sunday of the month (November 13) at 4 PM, will focus on Thanksgiving, and at Kids Night Out (notice the changed date to November 5, 5:30-7:30 PM) children will explore a new aspect of love. The best thing is, the parents get two children-free hours to love each other - time for themselves.

ST. PAUL'S COUNCIL MEETING OCTOBER 11, 2022

In Attendance: Pastor Dietmar Plajer, Peggy Peeler, Sara Adams, Sigrid Plajer as guest, Allen Wetzel, Josh Wenrich, Randy Tanner, Linda Turner, Bob Engel, Amy Caron, Kim Burkhart. Excused: Michael Zettlemoyer, Bev Heinemann, Kathy Ulrich, Shane Sanders.

Minutes of August Meeting: A motion was made by Bob Engel, seconded by Randy Tanner, and approved by Council to accept the minutes as submitted.

Financial Report: The Financial Report was reviewed by Linda Turner. Of note was an initial payment of \$8,827.87 from dedicated funds for the laser projectors. A large expense in September was our final insurance (flood and building/property) payment for the year of \$13,410.50. We experienced a loss of \$14,084.31 for the month. A motion was made by Kim Burkhart, seconded by Sara Adams, and approved by Council, to accept the Financial Report.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Dietmar recognized everyone for the reception on Kick-Off Sunday, the Rainbow Chair Project, the PFLAG booth at the Market Street Festival, and the great church picnic and Messy Church in September. Pastor Dietmar announced that Sigrid's mother is in the hospital in Germany and, depending on her health, they may have to travel with short notice to Germany.

Worship Service: Volunteers are needed for the tech booth on Sundays. Back-to-normal Communion in October went well and we will continue with hybrid Communion; however, gluten-free bread will be included moving forward. The Worship Committee will be tasked with exploring ways to do Communion (i.e., everyone going to the front, teenagers/youth assisting with serving, etc.). Communion servers, unless otherwise decided, for November will be the Class of 2023 and in December the Class of 2024.

Christmas Day Service: Christmas is on a Sunday this year. A motion was made by Kim Burkhart, seconded by Linda Turner, and approved by Council not to have an in-person service. Pastor Dietmar will pre-record a short service for December 25th.

Messy Church: Forty-two people attended the October 9th Messy Church event and it was very well received. Craft projects were fun, the sheep and goat game was exciting, and the food was great. Next Messy Church is November 13th.

Group Study: Due to lack of participation, the Monday evening

study group "Practice Your Faith" based on "Naked Spirituality" by Brian McLaren has been canceled.

PFLAG: The first meeting was held in September with 10 attendees (6 in person and 4 on-line). Many people gave the thumbs up as they passed the booth at the Market Street Festival, and comments received were positive.

Treasurer: Darin Namminga turned down the Treasurer position and we are again accepting applications for the position. The position will be placed on Facebook by Sigrid Plajer.

Kids Night Out: The first KNO was held in September and was enjoyed by both kids who attended and by parents who had a night out. The next KNO is October 15th.

Habitat for Humanity: Eight people helped out at a Habitat for Humanity event in Sunbury, doing yard clean-up, tearing up old floors, using power tools, and having a great time. Randy Tanner reported that the organization would welcome our participation at future events.

Church Safety Plan: Linda Turner sent a draft of the Plan to all Council members prior to the meeting. She asked that everyone provide feedback and also for input on information still needed as noted in the document.

Adult Sunday School: The focus of Adult Sunday School is Mature Faith and it is going well, with some minor technical issues to be resolved.

Central Association UCC 60th Anniversary Celebration: Randy Tanner attended and reported that the message he took away from the event was that as a church we need to ask ourselves the question, "If the church closed its doors, what would our community miss?"

Financial Other: The order for the video upgrade for the sanctuary has been signed and a down payment sent. We do not have a confirmed start date for installation.

Stewardship: Stewardship Sunday is November 13th. Pastor Dietmar distributed copies of a booklet "On Giving" and asked Council and Finance committee members to read and provide feedback on what was meaningful. Several people responded. Discussion centered around why we give to St. Paul's, the mission of the church, and a suggestion that Council pledge first.

Pastor Vacation Days: Pastor Dietmar requested October 25-28 as vacation days. A motion was made by Randy Tanner, seconded by Josh Wenrich, and approved by Council, to approve the vacation.

Property & Grounds, Other: No updates on open items as the committee has not met recently. Volunteers are needed to help insulate the foyer ceiling on Saturday, October 22nd beginning at 8 a.m. In addition to Rick Campbell, we will need 5 people. Pastor Dietmar will send out a request and also put it in the weekly eNews.

Council Members: In January 2023, we will need 6 new Council members – one is a 2-year term and five are 3-year terms. Possible candidates were discussed and recruitment will start immediately.

Personnel: Two additional Kids Night Out/Nursery Attendants have been hired, for a total of three helpers.

Pastor Dietmar and Sigrid Plajer, guest, left the meeting prior to the following discussion.

Office Furniture: Sigrid Plajer spends a great deal of time in the office and also works from home. When in the office, she uses a small work table which is inadequate for the work she does. Using her personal credit card, she purchased \$1,300 worth of office furniture and is asking for reimbursement. The Finance Committee is recommending reimbursement. A motion was made by Randy Tanner, seconded by Sara Adams, and approved by Council to reimburse Sigrid for the cost of the furniture.

Messy Church Coordinator: Christian Education and the Finance Committee are recommending a new position, Messy Church Coordinator, as a paid position. The job description was sent to Council for review prior to the meeting. The position would pay \$3,182 per year, would be a 10 month position, and paid out over 12 months. A motion was made by Sara Adams, seconded by Josh Wenrich, and approved by Council to approve this as a paid position. Sigrid Plajer has been performing the duties of this position, unpaid, for several years. A motion was made by Sara Adams, seconded by Randy Tanner, and approved by Council to offer the position to Sigrid.

Next Council Meeting: November 8, 2022 - in person and Zoom.

Devotions for next Meeting: Linda Turner The meeting closed with The Lord's Prayer.

PASTOR'S REPORT SEPTEMBER 2022

Our St. Paul's Mission is to grow in faith, to worship God, to serve others, and to welcome all.

I am moved by the heartfelt welcome back from my sabbatical which you expressed in and after the worship service on our Kickoff Sunday, Sept. 11. The many thank you notes, the wonderful reception, and your smiles warmed my heart. I am deeply grateful for the sabbatical time of renewal and to Rev. Darin Namminga for filling in for the three summer months during my absence. I reported about my sabbatical experiences on page 2 of the Sept. 2022 newsletter.

We kicked off the program year with a new worship series, "Practice Your Faith: 12 Simple Steps to God." The Worship Team, with Carolyn Fairl's leadership, helps make the theme tangible. You notice the spiral artwork and decorations that capture attention and imagination. The Senior Choir excels, and the various musical contributions are heartwarming. I am grateful to all who provide children's messages, function as lectors, greeters, and acolytes.

The Rainbow Chair Installation on our front lawn demonstrates our extravagant welcome and inclusion of all of God's people. I've heard from many people from the community how important our LGBTQ+ inclusive and affirming message is. Jesus loves all and so do we. The Daily Item presented the message to the community. Thanks to Shane Sanders for spearheading the project and for all who supported her in bringing it to fruition. In September we kicked off a hybrid PFLAG support group for Snyder County in Selinsgrove and participated in a PFLAG stand at the Market Street Festival.

The Picnic with Messy Church at the East Snyder Park on Sept. 18 was a great success with 72 persons participating. Children, youths, and adults had a blast with the crafts and games. Some highlights were tie-dye T-shirts, paint pouring, animal-ice-chopping, sand art, coke and mentos experiment, and giant bubbles. I'm grateful to all who contributed to the picnic, especially those who donated hotdogs and ice cream. Messy Church is a key ministry of St. Paul's that attracts new people to our congregation.

I invested a significant amount of time and energy in pastoral care and our congregational caring ministry. On a regular basis we have people from St. Paul's and from our community facing life-changing challenges. I am deeply grateful to all who participate in our Card and Care ministry. Their love, prayers, and care assure people that they are not forgotten, and that God is with them in and through their challenges.

Thank you for your prayers, your witness, your giving, your service, and your faithfulness to God and to God's work through St. Paul's. You are the hands and heart of Jesus in action!

We all fall into the trap of giving God our leftovers. After we pay for everything else — mortgage, utilities, food, transportation, insurance, cable, internet, cellphone, gym, kids' sports and activities, vacation, college fund, investments, debt, taxes, frivolities — then, maybe, we give God from whatever is left.

Faithful stewardship reverses that. Plan your giving to the church and other places you care about first, and structure the rest of your life around that.
