FROM OUR UCC PENN CENTRAL CONFERENCE

Our national United Church of Christ is shrinking. Every week, three UCC churches in the country are closing their doors. I hope, pray, and work hard that this will never happen to our beloved St. Paul's. And I invite you to do the same

Due to declining membership and resources, our UCC Penn Central Conference is considering merging with the three other UCC conferences in Pennsylvania (South East, North East, and West). "Together we are stronger," is the reason why the four Pennsylvania Conferences are considering to unite and share resources, ministries, and staff.

A Keystone Working Group comprised of representatives of all four Pennsylvania UCC Conferences has been meeting since fall 2022 to explore if and under what circumstances such a merger is feasible. Much information is available at www.psec.org/keystone. Our Penn Central Conference is looking for input from our local UCC congregations during various Town Hall Meetings this fall.

There are three dates on which we as members of St. Paul's can participate in listening, providing input, and asking questions of the Keystone Working Group: Wednesday., Oct. 11 at 6:30 p.m. at St. John's UCC in Lewisburg (in person); Wednesday, Nov. 1 at 6:30 p.m. (via Zoom); Saturday., Sept. 4 at 9 a.m. at our UCC Central Association fall meeting via Zoom.

I invite you, the members of St. Paul's, to consider joining me in one of the meetings mentioned above. A stronger UCC Conference will support us in becoming a better, more vibrant and effective St. Paul's.

Updates about the Search Committee for an Associate Pastor

Church Council is pleased to share the names of the individuals who will serve on the committee to lead the search and call for our new Associate Pastor. The committee chair will be Peggy Peeler, and regular members will be Marty Blessing, Jared Roush, Raven Rudnitsky, Shane Sanders, Randy Tanner, and Chanin Wendling. In addition, Malcolm Derk and Sara Adams will serve as auxiliary members, representing our families with small children. We are confident that this group will serve as excellent representatives of St. Paul's, and we pray that God will guide their work in this important endeavor. Church Council followed the guidance of the congregation in asking persons to serve on the Search Committee. Those who received more nominations from

the congregation in worship on Kickoff Sunday, Sept. 11, were asked first to serve. We have a great team of long-term and newer members, younger and older ones, and female and male representatives of the congregation. The Search Committee members will be officially installed into their role during a worship service in October.

The first task of the committee will be to develop a profile of St. Paul's to be shared with potential candidates, and they will be seeking input from the congregation to aid them in this project at our worship service on Sunday, October 29. The Search Committee will update us regularly as the search proceeds.

ST. PAUL'S COUNCIL MEETING SEPTEMBER 12, 2023

Because of the timing of the newsletter publication, these newsletter minutes are not the official, approved minutes. After the minutes have been approved at the next meeting, the final minutes are available upon request.

In Attendance: Pastor Dietmar Plajer, Sigrid Plajer as guest, Allen Wetzel, Randy Tanner, Linda Turner, Malcolm Derk, Mary Dahlmann, Shane Sanders, Sara Adams, Fritz Heinemann, John Fischer, Kim Burkhart, Amy Caron, Peggy Peeler as Guest. Excused: Josh Wenrich, Michael Zettlemoyer.

Associate Pastor: Peggy Peeler joined the meeting to discuss candidates for the Search Committee. The committee will consist of six members plus Peggy as chair. At the September 10th worship services, members were asked to recommend people who might serve on the committee and, from this list, Council agreed on guidelines for contacting people to serve. Linda Turner will email Council members and keep track of the call list. Peggy Peeler then left the meeting.

Minutes of June Meeting: The August meeting minutes were approved as submitted.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Dietmar sent his report out in advance of the meeting. He expressed his thanks to all those who decorated the church for the "Quest: The Adventurous Traveler" worship series, to those who helped organize the block party, and to all who participated by donating items for the welcome backpacks program

Financial Report: The August Financial Reports were sent out

in advance of the meeting and were approved as submitted with no concerns.

Strategic Planning: Pastor Dietmar gave a brief update on items from our Strategic Plan. Shane Sanders is leading a First Nations Bible Study group on Sundays at 9:15a.m. Other items on the Strategic Plan are on hold pending additional staffing.

Property & Grounds: Allen Wetzel reported that the person who removed our old cooking range was interested in purchasing the mixer for \$300. Council approved the sale of the mixer. This person said he also would be willing to haul away the old boilers free of charge. Property & Grounds is recommending selection of Shaffer's Plumbing & Heating as the contractor for the boiler with an estimate of \$72,500 for the work and Council approved Shaffer's as the contractor pending approval of the cost by Stewardship & Finance. Allen reported that Property & Grounds will get quotes for the replacement of the upstairs hallway water fountain and that Shaffer's will offer a quote. Another project being worked on is the oak tree out front which is causing the sidewalk to buckle and needs to be removed.

Emergency Plan: Linda Turner reported that the AED unit is now in a box and has been mounted on the wall at the top of the stairs leading from the foyer to the lower level. She will be budgeting for a second AED unit in 2024 as there should be one on each level. The sign for the bathroom off the kitchen has been installed. Crash bars at the main entry are still recommended and P&G has been asked to research.

Children and Youth Ministries: Mary Dahlmann reported that the search for a Youth Leader has not been fruitful. Chris-

tian Ed met and is discussing the possibility of breaking out the position into several positions. Sunday School is covered with volunteers through November 12th and, until someone is hired, we will continue to need volunteers. Mary is also looking for people to volunteer as back-up in the Nursery when one or both of the attendants cannot be there. Julia Dudek has been hired as Joyful Noise Director.

Stewardship Program: The tentative theme is "Embracing Our Vision" and Stewardship Sunday is November 12th. Program is in the planning stages.

2024 Budget: Linda Turner reminded those who chaired committees that budget requests were due and should be sent to her no later than September 14th. Information was shared from Property & Grounds that the renovation project may cost between \$250,000-\$300,000 and would require funding.

Personnel Committee: Our By-Laws currently state that members of the Personnel Committee need to be Council members and the rotation on and off the committee does not provide continuity for the tasks required. The By-Laws will be reviewed to determine whether Personnel can be a standing committee rather than a rotating committee.

Communion October 1: Class of '23 will serve – Shane Sanders (captain), Sara Adams, Linda Turner, Michael Zettlemoyer. Amy Caron will not be available to serve.

PASTOR'S REPORT AUGUST 2023

Our St. Paul's Mission is to grow in faith, to worship God, to serve others, and to welcome all.

We continued with our worship series "Quest: The Adventurous Traveler" in August. We explored together how our faith and life journey relate to our traveling experiences. We are invited and challenged to trust Jesus' guidance, to open up to new experiences, to remain curious and to be changed through the encounters we have while traveling. Traveling does not need to be physical in the outward world. We can also explore new territory inwardly. I appreciate Shane Sanders sharing on "The Importance of Traveling" and the Worship Team for making our worship series visible and tangible through decorations and a lovely exhibition of travel-related items and books in the sanctuary. I'm inspired by those who provide Children's Messages, those who function as lectors, and those who share their special gift of music in worship. St. Paul's worship services are moving, meaningful and memorable.

We had a wonderful Messy Church in the Park on Sunday, August 13, 4-6 p.m. on the theme of Noah's Ark with a total of 54 persons participating including all children, families, and helpers. As always the crafts and games have been highlights and the fellowship heartwarming. Thanks to a terrific Messy Church Team led by Sigrid Plajer for making Messy

Church a wonderful experience for the community and for us.

"You Matter!" was the focus of our Blessing of the Backpacks in worship on August 20, the Sunday before the first day of school in Selinsgrove. Children received blessing tags for their backpacks: "May you be curious and kind, gentle and strong, brave and loving! You are loved and cared for by St. Paul's UCC."

I invest much of my time and energy in working with St. Paul's committees and ministry teams to further our mission. In August I coordinated and met with Christian Education, Property and Grounds, Church Growth and Membership, Personnel, Music, Stewardship and Finance, Worship, and Church Council. I'm very grateful that we found and hired Julia Dudek, a Susquehanna University student, as new Joyful Noise choir director. Julia comes highly recommended by our church musicians and parents of Joyful Noise children.

I have been visiting homebound persons and those residing in nursing facilities together with Pastor Mary Peterhaensel and Susan Bolig (the Visitation Team Leaders) and supporting them in sharing Home Communion. It is deeply meaningful and moving to commune tangibly with people who are declining in their physical and mental abilities. Singing the good old hymns like "In the Garden"

draws people out of their isolation. I'm very grateful to all who participate in the Visitation Ministry Team. I continue to be on call 24/7 to visit people in the hospital and to provide spiritual care for people who experience heart-wrenching life altering challenges.

Fred Ulrich passed away unexpectedly August 1, and we celebrated his life and legacy with a special service at St. Paul's on August 7. It was beautiful to have so many firefighters, EMS volunteers, and community members participate in the service. I'm grateful for the Hospitality Team, led by Susan Bolig, for organizing, planning, caring, unlocking, and cleaning and closing up after special services in our sanctuary.

Thank you for your prayers, your witness, your giving, your service, and your faithfulness to God and to God's work through St. Paul's. I see God at work in and through you!



First Nations Version Bible Study Sundays at 9:15 a.m.



We get a deeper and better understanding of some of our most familiar Bible stories by exploring them through the First Nations Version (FNV) translation of the New Testament in a Bible Study that Shane Sanders is leading on Sunday mornings in our Council Room. You can participate in person or via Zoom on any Sunday.

In September we focussed on the Lord's Prayer and the parables of the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son. We shared some land acknowledgments of native tribes we are aware of. For example, Susquehanna University adopted the following: "We acknowledge the Susquehannock tribe whose name we bear. It means those who

live in a place where water is heard grating on the shore, commonly known as river people because they lived in unanimity and balance with the river and land. This campus rests on their un-surrendered territory, and we strive to honor their memory by being mindful stewards of this beautiful place."

In addition to people from St. Paul's, we have had people from All Saints Bethlehem Church in Brooklyn, NY and friends and relatives from Delaware participate via Zoom. We are grateful to Shane Sanders for leading this Bible Study. It gives those who participate a new and better understanding of key passages of the New Testament.
