RETURNING TO MINISTRY

It is with great joy that I'm returning from my sabbatical refreshed and renewed. My first Sunday back will be Kick-off Sunday, September 11, for our 10:30 AM worship service. I am looking forward to seeing you then.

What did I do during my sabbatical?

For one week in June I retreated to a Franciscan Hermitage in Aston, PA. There I read, meditated, reflected, and "let go." Also, during the time there, I did some painting. I breathed through deeply and reconnected with my soul.

During the second half of June, Sigrid and I travelled to visit with her parents in Germany. Brigitte and Kurt are turning 79 this year. They are slowly declining and becoming more frail. As we visited, we became aware that it may be the last time that we saw them still living independently in their apartment.

For a week following our visit in Germany, we rented a boat in the Netherlands, navigating on their expansive canal system. We traveled with the houseboat through some of the scenic cities and amazing landscapes. Highlights on our boat tour were Utrecht, Gouda (that's from where the cheese

got its name), Leiden, Haarlem, and Amsterdam. Leiden is the city where the Pilgrims gathered as a congregation for two years before departing for the new world, landing at Plymouth Rock in 1620.

In July I participated in a colloquy for clergy colleagues from Germany and the United Church of Christ at Elizabethtown College. We focused on "Building a Just Peace in an Unjust World: Learning with and from Our Anabaptist Colleagues." The presenters were representatives from the Mennonite Church, from the Church of the Brethren, our UCC General Minister, Rev. John Dorhauer, and our Penn Central Conference Minister, Rev. Carrie Call. We visited an Amish buggy builder and an Amish farm where we were served lunch in traditional style.

During July I also took up pottery again. I discovered small unfinished bowls from 2019, which I had not touched since before the pandemic. Creating pottery is rewarding. It's hands-on, centering, and with tangible results. I tried some new forms and figures. Some turned out disastrous, glued to the shelves of the kiln due to running glazes. I had to chip them off. And some turned out just like I envisioned.

In August I focused mostly on spiritual practices, reading, and my dreamwork. I read "Bittersweet: How Sorrow and Longing Make Us Whole" by Susan Cain (the author of Quiet). I resonate deeply with her book. I got the sense that she understands me. I returned to some of my treasured authors and spiritual guides like Anthony DeMello, Henri Nouwen, Barbara Brown Taylor, Brian McLaren, and C.G. Jung, engaging in soul work with them.

Working in the garden, biking with Sigrid on the Isle of Que, and exercising complemented my spiritual and educational work. Together with Sigrid, we have been tent camping a couple of days at the Hickory Run and Colonel Denning State Parks.

During the last two weeks, I've been gearing up for our program year, planning for a new worship series and group study.

I am deeply grateful for this sabbatical time of renewal and for all of you who made it possible. A special thank you goes to Rev. Darin Namminga who filled in during my absence and to Linda Turner and Sigrid Plajer for their amazing work in the church office. I return refreshed and renewed. I hope and pray that with Kickoff Sunday, September 11, you will engage in the wonderful opportunities outlined in this newsletter. We want you and we need you. I hope you will make growing in faith a priority during this fall season. And I hope to see you, if not before, on Kickoff Sunday, September 11, at 10:30 in worship and at our Picnic with Messy Church from 4-6 PM at the East Snyder Park.

Often in ministry it is challenging to determine what was successful because



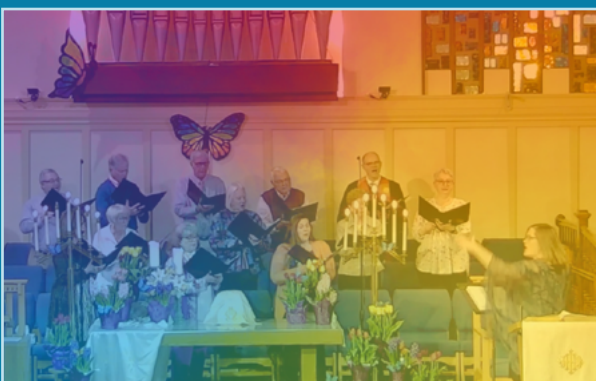

HOW TO GROW IN FAITH? - GROUP STUDY MONDAYS AT 7 PM

If I want to run or walk a 5K, I start walking one step at a time, each day a few more steps, moving toward the 5K goal. The best way to run or walk a 5K is to start walking and running.

I cannot play the guitar. If I want to learn how to do that, I borrow or buy a guitar and find a teacher. If I practice with the teacher's guidance, I will learn step by step how to play the instrument.

I do not speak Spanish. If I want to learn Spanish, I'll get an app, computer program, book, or teacher. Listening and learning how to pronounce, speaking one word at a time, step by step, I learn to speak Spanish.

How do you grow in faith? There are things you can do to grow spiritually. One step at a time, following tried and time-proven ways, you can grow closer to God. That is what our new worship series and group study will help you do.

Grow your faith in practical

ways by joining us in worship beginning with Kickoff Sunday, September 11, at 10:30 AM and/or by participating in our group study on Mondays at 7 PM beginning with September 12. Pastor Dietmar will facilitate the study, which will be in person in the Council room and via Zoom.

ST. PAUL'S COUNCIL MEETING AUGUST 9, 2022

In Attendance: Sara Adams, Sigrid Plajer (as guest), Bev Heinemann, Allen Wetzel, Michael Zettlemoyer, Josh Wenrich, Amy Caron, Randy Tanner, Linda Turner, Kathy Ulrich.

Excused: Rev. Dietmar Plajer, Shane Sanders, Rev. Darin Namminga, Peggy Peeler, Bob Engel, Kim Burkhart.

Randy Tanner, Vice President presided over the meeting.

Minutes of July Meeting: A motion was made by Bev Heinemann, seconded by Allen Wetzel, and approved by Council to accept the minutes as submitted.

Financial Report: The Financial Report was presented by Linda Turner. Income for July included 5 Sundays; expenses 2 pay periods. Of special note was a \$750 donation for garage door openers and an additional \$500 donation for the laser projectors (for a total of \$5,500) on our Wish List. We had Net Income for July of \$5,258.74. Josh Wenrich made a motion, seconded by Kathy Ulrich, and approved by Council, to approve the Financial Report.

Kick-Off Sunday: Worship service returns to 10:30am beginning on Kickoff Sunday, September 11th. Sigrid Plajer will place information in the August newsletter and in eNews. A picnic with Messy Church is planned on September 11th in the large pavilion at East Snyder Park from 4-6pm. Property & Grounds will provide grills, hot dogs, buns, and condiments; Loaves & Fishes will provide ice cream and drinks; Messy Church and Christian Ed will provide activities and games. Sigrid reported that Jevan Beaver will bring a grill. Attendees are asked to bring a dish to share and their own dinnerware and utensils. Dinnerware and utensils should be items that can be taken home and washed and not paper or styrofoam.

Central Association (UCC) 60th Anniversary Celebration: Celebration will be held September 18th from 2-5pm at St. John's UCC in Lewisburg. They have asked that each church provide a brief history of their church, photos of the church and events, and that the church have representatives attend. Randy Tanner said he may be able to attend.

Financial Other: John Fischer has been writing checks while Bill Hockenbrock is recovering from surgery. It was noted that we needed another person authorized to sign checks who is readily available. Currently, Bill Hockenbrock, Allen Wetzel, Peggy Doak, Sally Lauer and Susan Bolig are authorized to sign checks. S&F recommended that we add John Fischer to the list. Linda Turner made a motion, seconded by Michael Zettlemoyer, and approved by Council to accept S&F's recommendation. S&F also made a recommendation to update who is authorized to pick up the money bag from Northumberland Bank. Currently, those authorized are Bill Hockenbrock, Allen Wetzel, Cindy Martin and Sue Nentwig. A motion was made by Allen Wetzel, seconded by Josh Wenrich, and approved by Council to

update the list to Cindy Martin, Linda Turner, John Fischer, Allen Wetzel, and Bill Hockenbrock. Linda Turner will prepare the necessary letters to Northumberland Bank for signature and notify anyone who is required to go into the bank to sign paperwork. There has been some confusion on whether or not a church credit card has been approved by Council. At its meeting, S&F recommended a credit card in the church's name, with Linda Turner as authorized user of the card (Sue Nentwig had a card but it was cancelled). They also recommended that Randy Tanner sign as Authorized Officer for the church. Allen Wetzel made a motion, seconded by Bev Heinemann, and approved by Council to accept S&F's recommendation and to proceed with the application.

Music: Amy Caron announced that choir practice will begin August 31st at 7pm. She is attempting to get in touch with the Joyful Noise Director to determine a performance schedule beginning in the fall. There was some discussion as to whether or not the current Joyful Noise Director would be returning in the fall as she had accepted a position in Lebanon. Council gave the Personnel Committee approval to begin a search as soon as Amy had more information. The Music Chairperson recommended to S&F that, in the summer, non-member guest musicians be paid \$50 per performance. Council agreed that a cap in the amount of \$200 be put on the amount paid out through the end of the year. Linda Turner made a motion, seconded by Amy Caron, and approved by Council to pay \$50 per performance and to cap it for the year at \$200. Once the \$200 cap was reached, if a guest musician performed, he/she would not be paid.

Bridal Shop: The Letter of Understanding drawn up by Marv Rudnitsky was sent to all Council members prior to the meeting. A motion was made by Sara Adams, seconded by Bev Heinemann, and approved by Council to accept the Letter as written. Linda Turner will notify Marv of Council's approval and have him send out the letter.

Property & Grounds, Other: No updates on open items. Shane Sanders (through email) said she had a conversation with Rick Campbell about the energy audit and they are in conversation with a company and actively working to get that set up. It was her understanding that they were looking at next year for making a decision about the boiler. Allen Wetzel provided some information on the efficiency of the boiler but, again, they are waiting on the audit. Randy Tanner purchased black-out curtains for the upstairs bathrooms and will be getting them installed soon. The curtains should provide more protection from the heat.

Christian Ed: Sara Adams reported that plans are underway for the first Kids Night Out scheduled for the third Saturday of

each month from 5:30-7:30pm. The first event will be on September 17th. Christian Ed has approached Mercedes Nadal to assist with Kids Night Out since her position as Kids Group helper has been eliminated. Mercedes does want to continue her employment with the church and S&F recommended accepting Christian Ed's proposal. There should be no added expenses to the budget. Mercedes' job description will be updated to reflect the change. Linda Turner made a motion, seconded by Sara Adams, and approved by Council, to accept the recommendation.

Pool Party: Pool party was held Sunday, August 31st from 2-4pm at the Rudnitsky home. Randy Tanner asked, and Council agreed, that Council sign a Thank You card and send it to Marv & Raven thanking them for their hospitality.

Chair Project: All 11 chairs needed for the project have been donated and Shane Sanders is busy getting them painted. A banner was designed and ordered for the project. Sigrid showed Council a picture of what the banner will look like.

PFLAG: The first meeting is September 15th and it will be a hy-

brid meeting. Procedure to sign up to attend are being put in place to ensure the safety of everyone who attends. More information will follow.

Newsletter: Newsletter deadline is August 19th. Sigrid asked if we should do a paper newsletter, rather than digital, for September and perhaps several times per year. After discussion, it was decided to continue with digital with paper going out to those who request it. Instead of a paper newsletter for Kickoff Sunday it was decided to send out a postcard to everyone.

Next Council Meeting: September 13, 2022 - in person and Zoom.

Devotions for next Meeting: Randy Tanner
Prayer concerns were mentioned and the meeting closed with The Lord's Prayer.
